Minutes of March 10 meeting

President Greg Barron called the meeting to order at 10:12 am in the meeting room of the Liberty library. There were 13 attendees. Linda Lea gave the invocation.

Pres. Barron took up the minutes of the February meeting and asked that a correction be made to the day and date of the "Tall Ships" field trip. The correction was to change Tuesday, April 17th to Thursday, April 19th. The correction was noted and Linda Lea made a motion to approve the minutes as corrected with Dan Morgan seconding. The motion was approved by all present.

President Greg Barron welcomed everyone then moved directly into the executive reports.

President Report: Pres. Barron reported:

Heritage Day will be on May 5, 2012. We want to concentrate on the LRSH and member exhibitions in the library conference room. It had been suggested that the society include an art exhibit this year; however, this was rejected since it would conflict with the art exhibit sponsored by the Kelly Law Firm at their offices. A school group is scheduled to visit on April 5; the group will be visiting a number of historical and institutional sites in Liberty. On Friday, April 27, a class of '62 reunion group will be visiting. For Heritage Day, she's planning to have the LRSH open from 10:00 am until 4:00 pm. BITS AND PIECES OF AMITE COUNTY HISTORY

FRANCIS WREN SMILEY

- 1. Francis Wren Smiley, son of Nathaniel Francis Smiley and Martha Anne Andrews, was born on 26 Feb 1887 in Amite Co, MS, and died on 1 Aug 1963. Wren attended the Bethany School, Ariel, Amite Co, MS and is shown in the Bethany School photograph dated about 1901. Mississippi Sgt Medical Department World War I. Francis Wren Smiley and Margaret "Maggie" Hazlewood were married on 2 May 1920 in Amite Co, MS. Margaret "Maggie" Hazlewood, daughter of William David "Billy" Hazlewood and Elaine Leona Toler, was born on 26 Aug 1891 in Amite Co, MS and died on 26 Apr 1954. Both were buried in Bethany Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Ariel, MS. After marriage Wren and "Maggie" removed to Clarksdale where he delivered milk and was a mail carrier. One family story is that before house mail deliveries in the country, he organized a mail delivery service for families living in rural Coahoma county, which later led to becoming a mail carrier. Francis Wren Smiley and Margaret "Maggie" Hazlewood had the following children:
 - 1.1. **David Leslie Smiley** was born on 17 Mar 1921 in Clarksdale, Coahoma Co, MS and died on 27 Dec 2004. He resided at 7145 Renoldo St, Winston Salem, SC 27106. His Sunday School classes were broadcast on WFDD, an affiliate of PBS radio, for numerous years in the Winston Salem, NC area.

Why I became an historian

The ancient Roman essayist and orator Marcus Tullius Cicero wrote that people who do not know history must forever remain infants. We begin to grow up when we become aware that we have contributed but little to humanity's treasure, and are obligated to those who went before for nearly everything that makes us who we are. For me that awareness came when I was eight years old. My second grade teacher drew a map on the chalkboard to show the voyage of Christopher Columbus to the New World. I can see her standing before the class just as if it were yesterday and not a lifetime removed. She drew a country that looked like a leg and a boot kicking a triangular football that was Sicily. She told us that in Genoa on the west coast of that athletic leg a man was born who did something of surpassing importance more than four hundred years before I was born. Next, the teacher drew a line to show the route those three tiny ships took. She read the stirring poem "Columbus" by Joaquin Miller:

Behind him lay the gray Azores
Behind the Gates of Hercules;
Before him not the ghost of shores,
Before him only shoreless seas.
The good mate said: "Now must we pray,
For lo! The very stars are gone.
Brave Admiral speak, what shall I say?"
"Why, say 'Sail on! And on!"

The map, the discovery, the courage, and the consequences, all aroused my imagination. Dimly I apprehended the fact that the land upon which I lived was a New World, its existence unknown [to] those who gave me my language, the priestly nation who gave me my religion or to the Scots

who provided my family name and lineage. The ripples of my awareness extended from that startling revelation. I discovered a library filled with books about other daring and innovative people. I read about those who solved the mystery of the flooding of the Nile, and who began the age of the wheel, and who learned how to measure the passage of time. The study of Latin was another revelation. It taught me that long before people of the Mediterranean world knew of a Scotland (or a Smiley) they knew words which became the very building blocks for the language I heard around me every day.

Johnnie Lee Crawford, son of Joe and Ruby Crawford, was born in 1925 in Walthall Co, MS and died in 1961. Both were buried in Hollywood Cemetery, McComb, Miss. Johnnie Lee was an accountant with Great Southern Wire Box Company in Fernwood, Pike Co, MS. Sara Frances Smiley and Johnnie Lee Crawford had the following child:
 - 1.2.1. Linda Diane Crawford was born on 28 Oct 1951 in McComb, Pike Co, MS. Diane attended Southwest Community College and graduated from University of Southern Mississippi school of Social Work. She worked for the State of Mississippi as a social worker in Adams County before retiring in June of 2011. Linda Diane Crawford and Luther Jackson "Jack" Lazarus were married on 4 Jun 1977 in Central Baptist Church, McComb, Pike Co, MS. Luther Jackson "Jack" Lazarus, son of Herman Lee Lazarus and Rachel Marie Ballard, was born on 4 Sep 1945 in McComb, MS. Diane and Jack lived in Natchez, MS, Mar 2012
- 1.3. William Clayton "Billy" Smiley was born on 14 Mar 1926 in Clarksdale, Coahoma Co, MS. He died on 23 Jan 2002 and was buried in Memorial Gardens, Clarksdale, MS. Billy was born on 14 March 1926 and died 23 January 2002. Billy worked with South Central Bell and resided in Greenville, MS. William Clayton "Billy" Smiley and Frances Irene Green were married in 1948. Frances Irene Green was born on 8 Mar 1927 in Lambert, Quitman Co, MS and died in 2006. Frances graduated from Lambert High School, Quitman Co, MS. Frances' family moved from Lambert, MS to Clarksdale, MS. William Clayton "Billy" Smiley and Frances Irene Green had the following children:
 - 1.3.1. **Sharon Smiley** was born on 22 Jun 1949. **Sharon Smiley** and **Thomas Gaston** "**Tom" Hutchison** were married on 7 Aug 1971. Tom was employed with Wastequip in Alexandria, LA, where they resided in Mar 2012. **Thomas Gaston "Tom" Hutchison** was born on 5 Aug 1949 in Indianola, MS.
 - 1.3.2. Frances Wren Smiley was born on 30 Dec 1953. Frances Wren Smiley and Kenny Dukes were married. They divorced. .
- 1.4. **Charles Robinson Smiley** was born on 8 Jul 1931 in Clarksdale, Coahoma Co, MS. Charles joined the US Air Force in 1950, his last year at Clarksdale High School, Clarksdale, MS.
